Distinctive Features of the Course:

- 1. This course will enable you to understand the expectations of studying for a degree in your chosen subject at the University of Wolverhampton.
- 2. It will help you enhance your capabilities in English within an academic environment and digital environment. The University of Wolverhampton is a mature user of technology in learning and teaching. This course will enable you to develop your skills to be able to work in a digital environment
- 3. All the general modules will allow you to base your activities on the subject specific content of your course
- 4. You will recognise, plan and develop your own learning capabilities to enable you to progress to your next level of study
- 5. The course includes a module from the follow-on degree course, which means that a student will gain 20 credits prior to progression to the follow-on course on successful completion of the module.
- 6. The International Foundation Year will allow progression onto undergraduate degree courses at the University of Wolverhampton (with the exception of Nursing, Teaching and Pharmacy)

Educational Aims of the Course:

The Extended International Foundation Year will allow you to develop your capabilities to study in a specific subject as well as enhancing your English language skills. You will develop an understanding of the expectations and the academic skills required to study successfully for a degree in the UK. On successful completion of the course, you will then be able to apply for a degree course at the University of Wolverhampton.

You may enter the course at either IELTS 4.5 or IELTS 5.0 and will study the relevant modules to increase your English proficiency.

During the course, you will study a mixture of subject specific modules[e.g. Advanced Mathematical skills or Introduction to Business] and more general modules[e.g. Getting Ahead as an International Student] that will expand your English language and learning skills in preparation for your higher education journey.

You are encouraged to increase the benefit of the various tasks undertaken in the general study skills/language modules by applying them to some of the topics from your chosen academic subject.

To summarise, the course will give you;

- An introduction to your chosen specialist subject
- A solid foundation in the key academic skills like research and referencing that will support degree level study.
- Academic Language Development skills
- o A choice of pathways based on your chosen degree course
