Distinctive Features of the Course:

You will complete actor training in vocal and physical skills. In addition you will work on the skills that will make you a creative actor and collaborator.

You will have a unique opportunity to work on 2 production modules during the degree which are taught full time and exclusively to other modules for a 3 week intensive period.

You will complete a substantial final year project which will enhance your future employability.

Educational Aims of the Course:

Aims

This course aims to combine the intellectual exploration of acting and the practical development of skills. It will develop the actor as collaborator – able to exercise his/ her craft and to contribute to the creation of work.

Future employment

The course would equip you to work with explorative companies such as *Stan's Café, Talking Birds, Knee High, Forced Entertainment* as well as in more conventional performance environments such as repertory theatre, film and television. You will also be equipped to seek employment in applied drama contexts, teaching, directing, writing and arts marketing.

You could continue your academic studies by progressing on to our MA in Contemporary Theatre and Performance (or other MA courses) and then progress to a PhD.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

Learning activities

- Workshops, rehearsals, solo audition work, responding to a professional brief, productions, practical classes, laboratory or studio-based practice, screenings, lectures, discussions (both online and in class), seminars, and tutorials.
- Tutor-led, student-led, and self-directed study activities.
- Resource-based learning, including library work and attendance at performances
- Opportunities to engage with the workplace might include: applied performance in museums, leading
 workshops in theatre and educational contexts, public performances in theatres and public venues,
 performing and presenting in a range of locations, participating in workshops delivered by visiting
 professionals.
- Learning activities in Acting will support your personal development, enable you to apply your learning to a range of different contexts, develop your understanding of how you might manage your future career, support your acquisition of subject-specific and generic skills, and help you to develop an understanding of how to deal with risk and uncertainty.

Assessment Methods:

At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)
Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)

In the final year of your undergraduate degree, and at the end of your postgraduate degree, you are likely to be expected to write an extended piece of work or research, such as a dissertation or a practice-based piece of research.

Student Support:

Academic study skills are supported through three modules which start by developing academic skills at level 4, moving to more formal research methods at level 5, and culminating in the application of study skills to significant work-related and career-related activities in Professional Projects at level 6. The level 4 module is designed to prepare you for your study at university and to provide advice and guidance on fundamental aspects of University study, including communications skills, personal development, and the use of feedback from assessments.

You will also receive support for your learning from: your personal tutor, the subject librarian, the department technician, the department administrator and departmental careers support.

Additionally, you will benefit from support and guidance offered by the subject Course Leader and also from specific module leaders and, where appropriate, from the Head of Department.

The University provides counselling and financial support, together with academic advice and guidance through the website (www.wlv.ac.uk/skills) and direct from the Learning Centre, including the provision of a Study Skills Advisor (for national and international students).

Reflective personal development practices are encouraged throughout the duration of the course, which will help you to monitor your progression.

Employability in the Curriculum:

Employability is central to the degree in Acting. Students will take part in regular public performances and work in modules on specific areas of the industry such as Radio and Television and Business Theatre. Students will have to prepare their on line profile including obtaining headshot as part of a module and during the 3 year course. The university also has a Career Development Week where students can take part in a variety of activities and attend talks which will help them to engage with the career they are going on to.

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
