Entry requirements are subject to regular review. The entry requirements applicable to a particular academic year will be published on the University website (and externally as appropriate e.g. UCAS)

One or more of the following:

- You must have a first or upper second-class Honours degree (i.e. 2.1 or above) within a health-related field or equivalent - e.g. medicine, dentistry, nursing/health visiting, environmental health, occupational health, pharmacy, or any other degree deemed appropriate by the award team
- Any 'non-standard' qualification judged by the award team to be equivalent of the above (e.g. a relevant professional qualification or public health-related experience) would warrant admission to the Postgraduate Certificate programme, successful completion of which will enable transfer to the Masters Award - the same conditions will apply to candidates offering a non-Honours degree
- In exceptional circumstances, and after a satisfactory interview with the award leader and/or course team, we would accept a minimum of three years experience at a senior level in a public health or related field.

International students will also require an IELTS score minimum of 6.5

Distinctive Features of the Course:

This programme has an established reputation for producing accomplished and highly marketable graduates in public health. The positive feedback we receive from our successful students demonstrates the value of completing the MPH at the University of Wolverhampton. Many of these graduates have achieved excellent jobs within public health and are working in powerful organisations such as WHO and the UN where they feel they can really make a difference to public health with the skills they have acquired from the programme.

We also have strong links with our research department (Centre for Health Improvement and Social Care) and have plans for students to undertake supervised placements within the department in order to engage with specific research projects, thus giving them invaluable research experience.

This programme is distinctive in that it promotes the social perspective of public health, an area that is currently being emphasised in national public health policy. However it also has a focused epidemiological and statistical foundation and this integration of the biomedical with social perspectives is considered to provide a more balanced approach to the complexities of dealing with public health.

The programme has a strong international focus and this global perspective is considered to be of value to both UK and international students.

The MPH has developed cohesive links with local PCT Public Health Departments. There are opportunities for students to meet public health professionals who are invited in as guest speakers. There are also strong links with voluntary public health agencies who are willing to meet with students and will offer voluntary placements. In this respect, students who are not familiar with the local area can be signposted to appropriate work experience that will serve to enhance their studies and improve their career prospects. To encourage

community and work based links the award will promote a student based conference at the end of each academic year that will showcase students achievements. All public health stakeholders and the voluntary sector will be invited to this event.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

Your learning will include the study of six modules a year (full time students). The learning activities which will support you in the achievement of the learning outcomes are wide and varied. Throughout the programme these learning activities will enable you to achieve our graduate attributes of digital literacy and global citizenship. Additionally you will become knowledgeable and enterprising in your chosen field. The types of learning experiences which will help you achieve this include:

Online Learning Units You will experience a variety of learning unit formats. Both teacher and student centred learning is encouraged. Within the Learning unit time will be provided where you are encouraged to be interactive with lecturers to aid clarification and extension of your knowledge and understanding. All learning material will be supported by digital technology to enhance learning, and will be made available for you to access independently throughout a module on CANVAS our virtual learning environment.

Debate and dialogue: The University's virtual learning environment, CANVAS provides a forum for you and your colleagues to engage in dialogue with each other as well as with academic staff.

Formative on-line assessments: Here opportunities will be provided for you to 'have a go' at some summative assessment tasks before the actual (graded) assessment is submitted. This will develop your academic and practical skills through tutorial guidance and feedback.

Peer presentations: You will be required to study some aspects of specific modules independently and feedback your findings to the wider group, which allows you to further develop your academic skills and understanding.

Independent and self-directed learning: These are essential aspects of 'reading for a degree'. Academics responsible for module delivery will ensure essential reading material is made known to you e.g. articles, chapters in books, whole books, policies and web based material. In each module there will be a degree of freedom for you to explore topics of your own choice in the context of the module specific learning outcomes. To achieve this you will be encouraged to seek out and review material additional to that recommended by module leaders to support your academic development in relation to the subject specific outcomes e.g.: topic specific articles, web sites or books.

Tutorials: Telephone based tutorial meetings with Module Leaders, the Award Leader and your Personal Tutor aim to tailor academic advice to meet your individual needs. By developing your own Personal Development Plan (PDP) you can get the most out of your higher education learning journey, and beyond, for example when pursuing employment or further HE courses.

Assessment Methods:

At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)
Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)

In the final year of your undergraduate degree, and at the end of your postgraduate degree, you are likely to be expected to write an extended piece of work or research, such as a dissertation or a practice-based piece of research.

The University provides a range of resources to support students directly with their learning as well as other areas of their life. These resources are all signposted through the University web pages and include;

Study Support

Academic skills support is available to all students throughout all levels of study, via the school and learning centres. Academic skills sessions are introduced within the induction programme, different modules and through a blended learning approach with access to material in VLE. This is designed to help you to use the learning resources effectively and also to help you when it comes to completing assessments. Academic skill development is further embedded within the curriculum at different levels; module lecturers, personal teachers and particularly the Award Leader will monitor your progress on the course and will encourage you to understand the grade you are awarded for a piece of assessed work, where necessary academic staff will encourage you to act on written feedback when your assessed work is returned to you.

Employability in the Curriculum:

Successful MPH students are attractive to both the NHS, Local authorities and the voluntary sector as potential employees. Career opportunities range from academic roles within public health, roles within health promotion, health statistics and epidemiology, Clinical Governance, Public health research and development. Students may also wish to pursue doctoral study.

Recently qualified students have progressed into Public Health departments within the UK and international students have secured roles within international organisations such as WHO and the UN.



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
