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## Entry Requirements:

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Entry requirements are subject to regular review. The entry requirements applicable to a particular academic year will be published on the University website (and externally as appropriate e.g. UCAS)

The applicants must be:

- Either a Level 1 Registered Nurse or Midwife with at least one year post-registration experience in the field of practice.
- Supported by an NHS Trust or equivalent employer.
- The minimum academic entry requirement is 120 Level 4 credits and 120 Level 5 credits
- In addition, the recommended academic entry requirement is at level 6, so students should, if possible, provide evidence of ability to study at degree level (in any subject).
- Students will be required to provide a statement of good health and character from their employing/sponsoring organisation.
- You must provide a named Practice Assessor and Practice Supervisor to support your 65 hours of supervised prescribing practice.

Recognition of prior learning will be considered on an individual basis as per the University's RPL guidance

## Distinctive Features of the Course:

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Students accessing this course are from a wide range of localities from within the West Midlands area. Networking between students is encouraged and considered to be a strength of the course as evidenced in previous student course evaluations. The award has a designated full-time member of staff who acts as course leader and who has expertise in the specific field of practice that the student is studying and as well as having experience of working as a practitioner in the same specialist area. In addition, the award, course leader and course team have engaged in research, published books, chapters and journal articles within the subject area, acts as external examiners for other HEI's and are members of national professional groups and forums.

## Educational Aims of the Course:

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The Prescribing for Practice (V150) course aims to:

1. Develop competent, safe and professional practitioners who have a sound theoretical knowledge base and who are fit for practice in prescribing from a limited formulary.
2. Equip students with the knowledge, skills and understanding to evaluate, enhance, synthesise and develop higher levels of decision making within the context of non-medical prescribing practice.
3. Support practitioners to work within codes and standards of professional practice to protect human rights, promote equality and manage risk in the safe delivery of health care.

## Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

We promote a blended approach to learning, some core content will be delivered in face to face traditional teaching style but will include interactive activities to challenge you and develop your knowledge and understanding of competence in practice We use a variety of approaches to enhance your ability to evaluate, articulate and apply evidence to shape your professional practice eg critiquing journal articles; informal presentations and case studies Problem based learning is an engaging and dynamic tool that can be an effective way to enhance your understanding of real practice issues. You will be supported to develop an evidence-based approach to expand your theoretical and practical knowledge of current practice The Faculty has a well-established and active service user and carer group (SUCCESS) which offers its members unique and individual experiences to help enhance the learning experience of the student Students will spend 65 hours in prescribing practice with their sponsoring NHS Trust/ employing organisation. They will be supported in practice by an identified mentor in prescribing practice who will assist the student in meeting their learning needs and assess their competency against the NMC/RPS Standards.

Different assessment methods have been utilised in order to bring variety to the course overall and to meet the different learning styles of students. These include a case study, written examination, practice portfolio and written prescriptions. Students will be assessed at one level (Level 6). Students will be encouraged to seek tutorial support to receive feedback from the module tutor or member of the module team.

You will receive feedback on your progress throughout your course. Feedback on formative (developmental work) will be provided through peer review and verbal feedback. Feedback on summative assessments will be provided in written form.

## Assessment Methods:

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At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)  
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)

Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)
