Entry Requirements:

Entry requirements are subject to regular review. The entry requirements applicable to a particular academic year will be published on the University website (and externally as appropriate e.g. UCAS)

- Applicants will hold live registrant status as an adult registered nurse / child registered nurse/ specialist community public health nurse, on the Nursing and Midwifery Council register.
- Applicants must be new to General Practice Nursing: within 12 months of employment. This will need to be verified by the GP employer within a reference of support to study.
- Evidence of a valid enhanced adult/child Disclosure and Barring Service check within 3 years of start of the course and occupational health clearance by GP employer, which needs to be validated in accordance with University of Wolverhampton admissions policy.
- Applicants will normally have a first degree, BSc (Hons) at 2.2 or above (in a relevant subject, or equivalent). Minimum of 60 credits at level 6 (studied within the last 5 years).
- Be employed as a general practice nurse by the start of the course.
- You will require a practice assessor and practice supervisor who are registered professionals within the field of General Practice and meets the NMC standards for assessment and supervision (2018).

Please note: You must provide information to satisfy all of the above criteria on application for the course. If you cannot provide this information, your application will not be processed

Distinctive Features of the Course:

Many students undertaking this award will have a preference to study a module at a time in order to build confidence and knowledge in the general practice setting. Therefore, the design of this award is to allow the student to gain knowledge and skills through the provision of the three modular approaches, to allow synthesis of theory to practice; a period of consolidation practice weeks are provided between each module.

Students accessing this course will be from a wide range of areas within the West Midlands. Networking between students is encouraged and considered to be a strength of the course as evidenced in previous level 6 student course evaluations. Therefore, the course is run concurrently with the level 6 Advanced Diploma in General Practice Nursing.

Practice assessors are encouraged to participate in induction and assessor network forums held once per module.

The course has a designated full-time member of staff who acts as course and module leader and who has expertise in this specific field of practice that the student is studying. In addition, staff within the teaching team have engaged in research, published book chapters and journal articles within the field of community nursing and public health, act as external examiners for other HEI's and are active members of national / professional groups and forums.

Educational Aims of the Course:

The course aims to:

- Equip the General Practice Nurse with underpinning theoretical knowledge and development of clinical skills to deliver person-centred care to individuals, practice population and communities.

- Encourage academic and clinical practice development for professional lifelong learning.
- Develop a critical understanding of the complexities that challenge individuals' health and discuss primary care services available to support the health and wellbeing of the population.
- Develop a proactive, reflective, and competent healthcare practitioner to utilise an evidence- based approach for practice and public protection across the life course.
- Promote the ethos of partnership working with other health and social care practitioners, service users, carers, and families.
- Appraise the scope and limitations of individual knowledge and skills and examine where learning has been applied to primary care practice.

The course satisfies the core capabilities as set out in NHS Health Education England Primary Care and General Practice Nursing Career and Core Capabilities Framework (2022) and RCGP competency framework for General Practice Nursing (2015).

Overview of Assessment:

As part of the course approval process, the course learning outcomes were mapped to each of the modules forming the diet of the programme of study. This process confirmed that all course learning outcomes can be met through successful completion of the modules. This mapping applies to the final award as well as to all of the intermediate awards.

Learning Outcomes

Modules

CERTHE01 Demonstrate a systematic understanding of knowledge, and a critical awareness of current problems and/or new insights, much of which is at, or informed by, the forefront of your academic discipline, field of study or area of professional practice with a conceptual understanding that enables the student: • to evaluate critically current research and advanced scholarship in the discipline • to evaluate methodologies and develop critiques of them and, where appropriate, to propose new hypotheses.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

The course runs over 52 weeks and is delivered alongside the Advanced Diploma in General Practice Nursing programme includes.

- An Induction Day at the university
- Three modules across semesters 1,2, and 3 through a 1 full day alternate weeks - taught provision at the university and
- Supervised clinical practice hours (minimum 24 hours per module)

We will guide and support your learning using a blended learning approach including:

Theoretical Activities: The theoretical aspects of the award will comprise of the following learning activities:

- Lectures using a variety of interactive learning methods that are supported by digital technology to enhance your learning.
- Debate and dialogue – the University virtual learning platform will provide a forum for you to engage in dialogue with other students in your group as well as the lecturers.
- Case studies
- Group work activities where you will have the opportunity to discuss your personal experiences and reflections on timetabled topics.
- Skills workshops

Practice Learning – There will be supervised teaching and assessment in practice in order for you to become knowledgeable and skilled in this professional role. You will be supervised by a practice - based assessor/ supervisor who will support and guide you through the process along with providing constructive feedback

on your development. You will be expected to maintain a practice document where you will benchmark your existing knowledge and competence and map your development against the RCGP GPN Competency template. This will show progression of knowledge and skills through to independent practice.

Independent and self-directed learning – this is an important aspect of post graduate study and throughout the modules you will be encouraged to become an independent learner, able to decide what to learn and how best to achieve this considering your prior learning and experiences.

Assessment: there will be two components to your assessments for each module; component one will be a theoretical element. Different assessment methods have been utilised in order to bring a variety to the course overall and meet the different learning styles of students, these include:

Component One

Module 1: A narrated presentation of a case study where you will be required to critically appraise the role of the GPN in the management of a care episode of a patient you have consulted with in General Practice.

Module 2: written public health focused essay 3,000 words.

Module 3: a 3,000 words reflective essay that critically explores the development of the GPN role.

Component Two will be the submission of a portfolio of achievement of formative and summative clinical skills. This follows RCGP core competency framework (2015).

You will be assessed at level 7; you will be offered the opportunity to submit through Turnitin for formative assessment and feedback.

You will receive feedback on your progress throughout your course. Feedback on formative (developmental work) will be provided through peer review, verbal feedback on skills performance and group/individual presentations and, in some instances written feedback will be provided. Feedback on summative assessments will be provided in written form on electronically submitted work in canvas.

Assessment Methods:

Personal Tutors

You will be allocated a personal tutor at the start of your course with whom you will build and develop a relationship to help you work towards achieving the course learning outcomes. Practice Assessor

You will be supported by a work-based Practice Assessor. This person must be a registered Nurse and holds experience in General Practice Nursing. They will assess your practice learning. They must be identified during the application process for the course and will service as a point of contact for your Academic Assessor.

Practice Supervisor

Within General Practice you will be part of a multi-disciplinary team who you will be able to learn from. Supervisors in practice will be able to support your learning and provide feedback of your attainment to your designated Practice Assessor.

Academic Assessor

You will be allocated an academic assessor at the start of the course with whom you will build and develop a therapeutic relationship. They will support your development of knowledge and skills and offer guidance and support for you and your practice assessor / supervisor.

Employability in the Curriculum:

This course has been developed in conjunction with practice partners and service users in order to reflect the increasing and rapidly changing complex environment in which health care takes place. The educational philosophy of the course aims to develop and demonstrate the qualities and transferable skills necessary for employment within general practice requiring:

- The exercise of initiative and personal responsibility
- Decision-making in complex and unpredictable situations
- The independent learning ability required for continuing professional development.

Throughout the course you will have the opportunity to develop and demonstrate a number of key skills to enhance your current and future employability within General Practice, some of these are listed below:

- Working effectively as part of a group and being involved in inter-professional working practices and educational opportunities.
- Demonstrate teamwork, leadership skills and be able to manage and resolve conflict.
- Be independent and self-directing in your own learning.
- Develop effective communication skills both written (via reports etc.) and oral (through formal presentations).
- Problem-solve and make sound judgements and complex decisions.
- Develop IT skills (which include use of virtual learning environments etc.)
- Time management and show the ability to be able to prioritise.
- Manage change and seek out innovative opportunities in order to enhance practice and service delivery.
