Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

The student support and guidance mechanisms are those provided by the standard University and School systems. Staff on the MA Sikh Studies will also offer one-to-one tutorials and workshops should you require additional support. At the outset you will be shown how to locate the learning resources in the University's Harrison Learning Centre. Most research on academic literacies and study skills development advocates embedding them in the subject rather than through bolted-on learning experiences and much of the MA Sikh Studies programme is geared towards developing your generic and subject-specific academic skills. All the modules require you to be reading and carrying out independent research every week. The subject specific input will be delivered through lectures, seminars, blended learning, workshops and fieldwork so that you have a variety of learning and teaching methods to engage with. A variety in the pedagogic approach will enable you to evaluate critically current research and advanced scholarship in Sikh Studies.

Formative feedback and learning activities offer you with the opportunities to write and revise using feedback prior to submission for assessment. This also moves you towards more self-regulated learning (engagement with feedback promotes reflection and self-assessment). You will receive timely and frequent feedback, providing personalised study skills support. Subject specific research skills are embedded in module learning activities - both in-class and out-of-class - and require you to use electronic resources to regularly locate information about authors, and theoretical/critical texts to engage in problem-based learning.

The assessments across the modules are scaffolded to build upon one another in terms of a structured approach to building your analysis and expertise as you develop through the course.

Assessment Methods:

At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)
Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)

In the final year of your undergraduate degree, and at the end of your postgraduate degree, you are likely to be expected to write an extended piece of work or research, such as a dissertation or a practice-based piece of research.

Student Support:

General University support:

<u>University Learning Centres</u> are the key source of academic information for students. Learning Centres provide physical library resources (books, journal, DVDs etc.) and offer a range of study areas to allow students to study in the environment that suit them best: Social areas, quiet and silent areas. The fieldwork opportunities in the MA Sikh Studies course provide you with experience of engaging with the public, Sikh organisations and other relevant settings. You are also encouraged to engage in personal development planning, to ensure that you take all opportunities to develop your potential. This covers skills required for learning, accessing and processing information, presentation skills, and working with others. This development of your academic competences at graduate level, together with practical engagement with local and national Sikh communities and Sikh organisations provides a good foundation for employment in the public sector. Social, religious and learning identities are an important aspect of many people's lives and stimulating an understanding of them is highly relevant to the caring professions, social services, community work, the police, nursing and a wide range of business activities. The central strand of technology running through the course means that you will be digitally literate and have a good understanding of the design and presentation of materials for different audiences.
