Entry Requirements:

Entry requirements are subject to regular review. The entry requirements applicable to a particular academic year will be published on the University website (and externally as appropriate e.g. UCAS)

All candidates will need to have;

- at least 2 years post-qualifying experience of mental health or related health and social care services; and
- an honours degree or successful study of at least one module at level 6.

To be eligible for entry to AMHP training modules, candidates must:

- be a social worker registered with the Health and Care Professions Council; or
- be a first level nurse, registered in Sub-Part 1 of the Nurses' Part of the Register maintained under article 5 of the Nursing and Midwifery Order 2001, with the inclusion of an entry indicating their field of practice is mental health or learning disabilities nursing; or
- be an occupational therapist registered in Part 6 of the Register maintained under article 5 of the Health professions Order 2001; or
- a chartered psychologist who is listed in the British Psychological Society's register of Chartered Psychologists and who holds a relevant practising certificate issued by that Society.

(The Mental Health AMHP Regulations 2008, Sch 1.

- be nominated by the local authority or other employer
- meet locally agreed employer criteria for recruitment and selection.

Local Authority/Agency commitment to provide a placement.

Additionally an AMHP candidate needs to be able to undertake the appropriate practice requirements under the supervision of an employer provided practice supervisor and assessor.

The course is linked to two stand-alone modules. It is recommended that one is taken before the PG Diploma in Mental Health Practice for AMHPs. These are:

- 6SO016 Decision-making & interventions for adults in a legal framework (L6);
- 7SO009 Decision-making & interventions for adults in a legal framework (L7).

Distinctive Features of the Course:

In 2012 the General Social Care Council inspected the course and spoke with candidates, employers and service users and carers. Employers said they were confident in the way the course is designed, their views were taken into account and the partnership with the academic team was strong. The course team strive to respond to the needs of individual students and to foster a positive learning environment.

The course will enable candidates to develop their knowledge, skills and values in mental health practices in order to enhance their capabilities within their own areas of expertise. The course is designed to enable mental health professionals to develop and demonstrate practice in accordance with the published

requirements of external professional, statutory and regulatory bodies in order to act as Approved Mental Health Professionals.

Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

Taught sessions will include the presentation of relevant information and concepts. These will then be discussed in relation to the candidates' practice and fictional practice scenarios. Candidates will complete 43 days of supervised practice in which they will undertake a range of tasks under the Mental Health Act and reflect on them in supervision. They will have the opportunity for 4 days for educational visits to individuals and services that will enable the candidate to extend their knowledge and experience.

Assessment Methods:

At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)
Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)

In the final year of your undergraduate degree, and at the end of your postgraduate degree, you are likely to be expected to write an extended piece of work or research, such as a dissertation or a practice-based piece of research.

Student Support:

The course requirements and assessed tasks are explained in a course handbook, module guides and portfolio documentation. These are explained at induction and frequently referenced during the course. Each module includes a workshop on the assessed task and dedicated tutorial time. Additionally, module tutors make themselves available for consultation before and after teaching sessions.

The course has been designed so that there are opportunities for formative assessment. One of the purposes of the formative assessment is to identify any academic skills support that may be required.

The University provides extensive academic skills support, including face to face or individual virtual consultations, published guides and workshops.

It is important that the module team work in collaboration with practice educators who will be assessing the candidates' practice. Each candidate has a named tutor who meets with him/her and the practice educator at the start of the opportunity for supervised practice (OSP). Practice educators are also expected to attend the portfolio workshop with the candidate, plus a dedicated assessor workshop on assessments.

Employability in the Curriculum:

Approved Mental Health Professionals undertake a range of duties under the Mental Health Act 1983. The Code

of Practice to Mental Health Act (1983) states that local authorities should ensure that sufficient AMHPs are available to carry out their functions under the Act and that a 24-hour service is available.

A local authority will approve an AMHP to act on behalf of the authority and will only do so if satisfied that the applicant has appropriate competence in dealing with mentally disordered people (MHA 1983 s114(3)). This can be demonstrated by successful completion of the course.



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
