#### Teaching, Learning and Assessment:

## Speaking skills

Assessment of speaking skills involves research based academic seminars

#### Writing skills

Assessment of writing skills involves research-based open-book assessments where students research and are expected to demonstrate use of academic conventions such as referencing and avoiding plagiarism, while also demonstrating a good command of grammar and vocabulary skills.

## Listening skills

Assessment of listening skills involves understanding organisation, gist and details in academic lectures.

#### Reading skills

Assessment of reading skills involves demonstrating awareness of organisation of texts and distinguishing main points from sub-points.

#### Assessment Methods:

At the University of Wolverhampton, a variety of modes of assessment will be used to support and test your learning and progress and to help you develop capabilities that are valued beyond your University studies and into your working life. Your course may include a variety of assessment activities:

Written examinations (including online examinations, open and closed book examinations and quizzes)
Coursework (for example, essays, reports, portfolios, project proposals and briefs, CVs, poster presentation)
Practical (for example, oral and video presentations, laboratory work, performances, practical skills assessment)

In the final year of your undergraduate degree, and at the end of your postgraduate degree, you are likely to be expected to write an extended piece of work or research, such as a dissertation or a practice-based piece of research.

#### Student Support:

Learning & Information Services (LIS) provides general academic skills support to all students. They can attend a drop-in session for an individual, one-on-one discussion with a Learning and Skills Librarian for advice on areas such as academic writing, assignment planning, exam preparation and time management. In addition, there is a regular timetable of bookable workshops covering information and digital literacy skills, including academic referencing. ### Employability in the Curriculum:

The programme is designed on the assumption that successful students will continue directly on to further subject based study at Undergraduate level. It does not therefore seek directly to prepare students for employment. Any students completing the programme and returning to their home country will have a strong command of English, and in addition will possess a high level of competence in analytical skills, pair and group work as well as experience of working in a multinational context. These represent important transferable skills when seeking employment as well as in the HE context or when setting up a business independently.
